Background


The California Voting Rights Act (CVRA) has encouraged many jurisdictions to move from at-large to by-district elections.

July 2018 - GSD received a California Voting Rights Act letter challenging GSD's atlarge election of Directors

August 2018 - GSD Board passed a resolution to transition to by-district elections after 2020 Census data were available

Tonight's Hearing – second of two initial hearings to be held within 30 days of each other. Purpose is to receive public input about factors to consider when drafting maps

Draft maps will be presented at subsequent public hearings in the Spring





Changing from at-large to by-district election of Directors

All GSD voters currently elect all Board members (at-large).

In *by-district* elections, a Director is elected by voters living in the election district. Directors must live in the district they represent.

- When demographers draft districting plans, federal and state laws apply (described later).
- Current Directors complete their terms of office even if they do not live in the new election district they would represent.
- The newly-created election districts will be used until after the 2030 Census, when GSD will need to redistrict if districts' total populations are no longer equal.

* Counts are from California's official redistricting data - the California Statewide Database's (SWDB's) adjusted 2020 Census counts to allocate inmates to previous home addresses.



GSD Populations from 2020 Census, by race/ethnicity


Pies show California's official redistricting data (adjusted by the SWDB to reallocate prison inmates to previous home addresses)



Legal guidelines that demographers follow:

- ✓ Federal law:
 - Population equality
 - Voting Rights Act
 - No racial gerrymandering

✓ State Elections Code



Demonstration of the Population Equality Requirement

Courts have allowed some deviation from exact population equality for jurisdictions like GSD: the spread between the most- and least-populous districts should not exceed 10% of the "ideal district population" which is 1/5 of GSD's total population.

Population Balance

GSD Total Population	39,092	
Number of Districts	5	
Each District's Ideal Population	7,818	
10% Deviation	782	

Difference between most- and least populous district cannot be more than 782 persons

Federal Voting Rights Act

Section 2 of the Federal Voting Rights Act:

Single-member election districts should be drawn so that members of protected groups (all race/ethnic groups except non-Hispanic Whites) have the ability to elect representatives of their choice if:

- The protected group is sufficiently large & geographically compact to form a majority in a single-member district
- The protected group is politically cohesive


The Federal Voting Rights Act

"Packing" and "Cracking" are prohibited


"Packing' refers to the practice of filling a district with a supermajority of a given group or party. 'Cracking' involves the splitting of a group or party among several districts to deny that group or party a majority in any of those districts."

-Vieth v. Jubelirer, 541 U.S. 267, 286 n.7 (2004)


Cracking



Best Practice:


Each orange block represents protected groups intact and in separate election districts

California Elections Code

- "...give consideration to the following factors:
 - (1) Topography
 - (2) Geography
 - (3) Cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory
 - (4) Communities of interests "

Communities of Interest (COIs)

COIs are contiguous areas in which people share social and economic interests and should be in a single election district, because their Community of Interest may be affected by the Policies of GSD Board of Directors.



- Recognized neighborhoods
- Cities and unincorporated communities
- Areas with similar demographic characteristics
- Areas with similar issues
